WE HAD IT! - Last Night!

Yes, we had it! Last night the W P Richardson passed a pretty vigorous test of strength by sailing right through a pretty severe storm. The Richardson passed the center of the storm area at about midnight last night, with no more consequence than a temporary loss of speed.

Navigator Nelson says the storm was a pretty bad one - even to the men who have seen lots of storms, big and little. At its worst extreme, the Barometer fell down to 28.53 - that is unusually low. The falling Barometer was accompanied by winds blowing as fast as fifty miles per hour. Winds of that velocity are referred to by navigators and nautical men as gales. When the Richardson was bucking the worst efforts of the gale she rolled to 30°, that is a tremendous roll, but far less than the 45° that the ship is built to stand.

During the storm the ship slowed down from about 20 knots to a little more than 12 an hour. By now, however, she has returned almost to her normal speed.

Ship's Navigator Nelson said he did not believe it likely that the Richardson would run into the Hurricane now slowly sweeping up the coast of the United States. He stressed that if the Richardson did run into any part of the storm, it would run only into the calmer trail of the larger storm.

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
